## Kestrels, Falcons and Children in Upper Key Stage 2 (Kestrels, Falcons & Eagles) made a fantastic

start to this academic year. For our Year 6s, the start of term was particularly exciting as the children embarked on the 3-day residential trip to PGL, Caythorpe. This was a superb way to build confidence and self-esteem, and most importantly, develop new relationships and friendships. Our children truly shone over those three days, displaying our 4Rs and striving to 'be the best they could be'.



Term one then got off to a flying start for all UKS2 pupils with our World War One topic. The children were fully engaged in all aspects of their learning and demonstrated excellent prior knowledge, which they could relate to the history lessons. They were captivated by the class novel, 'War Horse' (which brought a tear to the eye of more than

one!) Tag rugby was a huge hit, with children learning skills of throwing, evasion and scoring; PSHE explored feelings, and children valued the opportunity to discuss a range of emotions and thought about how to manage different situations; our artwork on silhouettes (linked to our WW1 topic) resulted in stunning classroom displays and the exploration of light in our science lessons offered the opportunity for practical sessions (building models to represent how light travels) and facilitated lots of new learning.

Term 2 proved to be just as exciting, and just as busy! We showed respect on Remembrance Day, were 'spottacular' for Children in Need, and were a rainbow of colour for our 'Day of Hope'. Alongside all of this enrichment (and between the preparations for all things 'Christmas') the learning continued! The children designed and wrote explanation texts for chocolate making machines, learned about the reasons for Fair Trade, baked cookies and made gift boxes for the finished product.





Our newly-formed football team from Year 5 and 6 entered their first tournament this term. They had never played as a team before and played against other teams with a lot more experience. Our team suffered some defeats, but they improved with every game and cliched a victory in our final match of the tournament, thanks to three fabulous saves in a penalty shootout! Every player tried their best and represented our school well. Our 'player of the tournament' was Otis, our goalkeeper, who was excellent in every game.

### Breakfast Club!

With the colder weather making an appearance, the children at Breakfast Club have been warming themselves up in the morning with delicious mugs of hot chocolate, beans on toast and warm buttered crumpets. After they have finished eating, the children have been practising their circus skills, impressing us with their juggling, baton twirling and plate spinning.
